

2020 Book Selections

January 29 - *Animal Farm* by George Orwell.

An allegory of farm animals who rebel against their human farmer, hoping to create a society where the animals can be equal, free, and happy.



February 26 - *The Bastard Brigade* by Sam Kean.

Nonfiction: a renegade group of scientists and spies worked to keep Hitler from acquiring a nuclear bomb.

March 25 - *The Beekeeper of Aleppo* by Christy Lefteri.

Puts faces on the Syrian war with an immigrant story of the triumph of the spirit when the world is unrecognizable.

April 29 - *Dinner at the Homesick Restaurant* by Anne Tyler.





Explores the very different experiences of one household from the viewpoints of each member.

May 27 - *The Dutch House* by Ann Patchett.

A paradise lost, a past that will not let go, and the indelible bond between two siblings.

June 24 - *The Glass Menagerie* by Tennessee Williams.

The renowned play tells the story of a family whose lives form a triangle of quiet desperation.



July 29 - *The Language of Flowers* by Vanessa Diffenbaugh. Victoria realizes she has a gift for helping others through the flowers she chooses for them.

August 26 - *Machines Like Me* by Ian McEwan. In an alternative 1980s London, a man buys a synthetic human and designs its personality. The resulting love triangle highlights a moral dilemma.

September 30 - *The Old Man and the Sea* by Ernest Hemingway. Told in language of great simplicity and power, a Cuban fisherman faces a relentless, agonizing battle with a giant marlin far out in the Gulf Stream.

October 28 - *The Quiet American* by Graham Greene. The classic exploration of love, innocence and morality in Vietnam. A brash idealist is sent on a mysterious mission.

November 25 or 18? - *Their Eyes Were Watching God* by Zora Neale Hurston. Brings to life a Southern love story and a strong female protagonist, with wit and pathos.
